



Scott Boggio

Scott Boggio is a 1978 graduate of Point Pleasant Borough High School, where he was a member of the football and track teams. As a senior on the 1978 football team, he started at offensive guard and inside linebacker. The Panthers finished the season with a 9-2 record and won the Shore Conference Class B title and South Jersey Group II state championship. He received all-county and all-shore honors and was selected to play in the inaugural Ocean-Monmouth County All-Star game.

Following graduation from Point Pleasant High school, he attended the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to study engineering, and he lettered three years on the varsity football team. He started at defensive end in both his junior and senior years. In 1982, his senior year, he defensively led the Quakers to a 7-3 record and to a share of the Ivy League Championship- the first league championship for the school since the late 1950's. During that year the Quakers were ranked as high as 7th in the nation in division 1AA. In addition to receiving All-Ivy honors, he was named defensive MVP for his play in the title game against Harvard at Franklin Field in what was headlined in the Philadelphia Inquirer as the "Miracle on 34th Street".



Following graduation from the University of Pennsylvania with a B.S. in Civil and Urban Engineering, Scott progressed in his career in commercial real estate with several national firms. He held positions as construction engineer, regional property manager, vice president of construction and planning and senior vice president of development and construction with the Bechtel Power Corporation, EQK Partners, VMS Realty Management and Compass Retail, Inc., respectively. In 1998 he became a founding partner of Gregory Greenfield and Associates, Ltd., a real estate investment company, specializing in the acquisition and redevelopment of regional shopping centers throughout the United States. The company currently has ten properties totaling 7.5 million square feet under investment management throughout the United States, in cities including Medford, OR, Salt Lake City, UT, Amarillo, TX, and Hicksville, NY.

Scott is a member of the International Council of Shopping Centers and the Penn Football Club. He is also an active member of the Saint Thomas Aquinas Catholic Church, where he teaches grade school catechism.

Scott and his beautiful bride of 13 years, Nancy, live in Alpharetta, Georgia, with their son Chase(10) and daughter Alexa (7).
